	The wealthy Choksi brothers believe they have so much power that they can change anybody's destiny by simply altering one's surroundings. This arrogance is reflected right from the very first scene and continues as the plot unfolds.
	<ul> <li>The film starts with a game of chess where the brothers bet on the theory that by changing a person's surroundings this will in turn effect one's actions. This act of arrogance forms the backbone of the plot and influences the events to come.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>To test their theory, they then frame their own employee, Uday, making him a criminal and deliberately putting him in prison.</li> <li>He reacts negatively by running away, proving their theory correct.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>They then invite another criminal (Guru) into their office and offer him a senior position in the company. This proves their theory that by bringing him in to a positive environment he will, in turn, react positively.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Eventually, the two victims discover the brothers' intentions and seek revenge by playing them at their own game in the stock market, ruining the brothers completely. For example, they were forced to buy shares that made them bankrupt.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>The film concludes with one brother losing mental balance and the other dying, showcasing how true arrogance can cause the downfall of a person.</li> </ul>

	Students may refer to all or some of the following points in their answers.
	<ul> <li>This film tells the tale of a twist in destiny where chess represents the 'game' that puts four people's lives in a frenzy.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>The game of chess is used in this film as a symbol of how two dons of the stock market, Yashvardhan Choksi and his brother Aditya Choksi, make plans to change people's lives by betting with each other while playing chess. They devise their cunning plans using the same strategic play they exploit on the chess board.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>The brothers use their Harvard-educated managing director, Uday Gandhi, and a criminal called Guru as their 'pawns' to win the bet, significant of how pawns are used in chess. In this game, one brother wins and the other brother loses.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Just as in chess, the two brothers represent kings who think that they can put forward anybody's life to save their own bet. The two dancer girls can be seen as queens who Uday and Guru are trying to protect from the brothers. Checkmate comes and tables turn when Uday beats them at their own game by making them bankrupt.</li> </ul>
